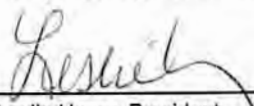

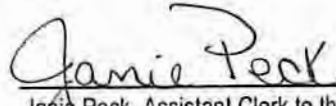

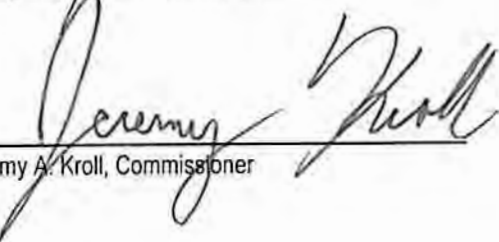

DJFS – OPIOID FUNDS

LIMBACH – COURTHOUSE ROOF

Michael Mitchell, Area Service Manager with Limbach presented the following Courthouse Rooftop AHU Condensation Issue Recommendations:

BASE OPTION: Minimum recommendation upgrades

- Recover refrigerant from DX cooling system.

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- Valve off and drain down hot water system connecting to the heating coil.
- Remove both coils from the Rooftop AHU (DX coil and hot water coil).
- Disassemble, cut and remove steel as necessary to raise both coils, provide steel supports within the system to support the new evaporator coil.
- Provide a new custom built stainless steel condensate pan to catch condensation directly under the coil in lieu of the entire floor base of the unit being the condensate pan.
- Re-pipe the condensate drain, also re-do the drain line and trap under the curb.
- Re-install both coils, recharge system, fill and bleed system.
- Pull vacuum down to 500 microns and re-charge system.
- Start system and check operation.
- This work is to take place between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- Limbach to provide all labor and materials to perform the above mentioned scope of work.
- Limbach's price is good for 15 days from 9-9-25.
- **TOTAL PRICE FOR BASE OPTION: \$42,300.00**

ADDITIONAL MORE PROTECTION OPTION: Re-build entire base

- In addition to the scope of work in the Base Option, we would remove the existing base pan and have another stainless steel custom pan built which is the floor inside the unit/walkway as it was originally designed. Note: we would install the custom pan directly under the evaporator coil (this additional pan would replace the OEM pan that has been compromised over the years and is deteriorating). Note: there appears to be spray foam in areas of this original pan.
- Removal of the entire blower assembly and motor, and removal of all associated piping, controls, and electric disconnect boxes that will interfere with the installation of the new base pan.
- Includes crane costs, materials and labor for completion (crane will be needed twice).
- Note: We believe some of the condensation issues with this system have come from rain-water entering the unit along with the AC system condensation; this pan would help to resolve any type of water getting inside the unit.
- **TOTAL PRICE FOR ADDITIONAL OPTION 2: \$32,516.00**

COMBINED TOTAL PRICE FOR BASE OPTION & ADDITIONAL OPTION: \$74,816.00

Gallia County OneOhio Grant Program

OneOhio Grant Application

The Gallia County Commissioners are pleased to announce the OneOhio Grant Program. This program distributes funds from settlement dollars awarded to the county to be used to prevent, treat, and support recovery from addiction including opioids and/or any other co-occurring substance use and/or mental health conditions which are all long-lasting diseases that can cause major health, social, and economic

problems. The commissioners are seeking projects which are evidenced-based or have history of proven success in achieving desired outcomes. Creativity and innovation are also encouraged.

Who is Eligible for a Grant?

- Tax-exempt, private agencies - 501(c)(3)
- Public charities as defined by the Internal Revenue Service
- Government agencies

What Period Do Grants Cover?

- Grants are awarded for a 12-month period
- A semi-annual report including budget update and narrative must be submitted every six months
- All applications must include a sustainability plan to continue the project beyond the end of the grant period. Applicants may submit for grant renewal for the next year with no guarantees of continued funding.

Grant Criteria & Allowable Costs

- Direct service strategies that help addiction-impacted families and children heal through navigation of system resources and improved access to grief and trauma supports
- Other allowable costs: Related supplies. Operational costs as they support the direct service strategy not to exceed 10% of total grant request including supervision of staff

and training

- Unallowable Costs: Administrative salaries & overhead. Equipment or other tangible items not directly related to the grant request.

Projects are to be directed toward decreasing opioids and/or any other including opioids and/or any other co-occurring substance use and/or mental health conditions. Projects may happen in any environment for any age group. This includes schools, colleges, universities, churches and other places of faith, and other community organizations. All projects should be inclusive and equitable in who is served and how the service is delivered.

Proposed projects will consider

- Collaboration and communication between the applicant and key community stakeholders leading to shared strategies
- Empowering behavior change and action through increased knowledge
- Strategies that decrease stigma and develop greater public awareness
- Strategies that lead to a decrease in unintentional overdose deaths
- Strategies that lead to a decrease in the suicide rate
- Evidenced-based practices
- Trauma - informed practices
- Strategies to build resiliency

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- Increasing health and wellness
- Promoting protective factors and decrease risk
- Empowering behavior change and action through increased knowledge

Project or Program Description

Our project places a dedicated School Resource Officer (SRO) in Gallia County schools to provide direct support for students, families, and community members affected by drug use. The SRO will serve as a bridge between law enforcement, schools, and local resources, focusing on drug prevention education, early intervention, and connecting families to treatment and recovery services. This program strengthens community trust while promoting safer school environments and healthier families.

What is the problem, challenge, or need addressed by the project/program? Gallia County continues to face high rates of drug misuse and related challenges among youth and families. Many students are exposed to drugs at an early age, while families struggle with access to reliable prevention, intervention, and recovery resources. Without consistent support in the school environment, students may lack the tools to make positive decisions and families may remain unaware of available services. This program addresses the need for early intervention, education, and support in order to break cycles of addiction and improve community health.

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Identify the best practice or evidence of success in the past.

School Resource Officer programs nationwide have shown success in reducing substance use, increasing awareness, and strengthening connections between youth, families, and community services. Evidence-based prevention strategies, such as classroom education, mentoring, and referral to treatment, have proven effective in improving outcomes for at-risk youth. Our county has previously seen positive impacts from community partnerships that combine law enforcement, education, and health services to address drug-related issues.

Approximately how many Gallia County residents will benefit from the project/program?*

250 families

Who will benefit directly from the project/program?*

Students in Gallia County schools will benefit through prevention education, mentoring, and immediate access to help. Families will benefit from guidance, resources, and referrals to treatment or recovery programs. The broader community will benefit from reduced youth drug involvement, safer school environments, and stronger family support systems.

Describe the goals and objectives of the project/program.

Goal 1: Reduce drug use and related issues among students.

Goal 2: Strengthen family connections to prevention and treatment resources.

Goal 3: Build trust and collaboration between schools, families, and law enforcement.

Objectives: Deliver drug-prevention education to all students, provide one-on-one support to at-risk youth, connect at least 50 families annually to resources, and reduce school-related drug incidents by

·measurable percentages over time.

What research, statistics, or evidence substantiates the stated need?*

Gallia County has been disproportionately impacted by the opioid crisis and substance misuse. According to Ohio Department of Health data, Southeast Ohio counties, including Gallia, continue to experience higher-than-average overdose rates. Local schools report increasing concerns related to student exposure to drugs and family instability due to addiction. Research shows that early intervention programs in schools can significantly decrease the likelihood of substance misuse later in life, making this program an essential preventive measure.

Provide a brief timeline of the project/program.

Month 1-2: Program launch, training, and integration of SRO into schools.

Month 3-6: Begin classroom prevention programs, student mentoring, and family outreach.

Month 7-12: Evaluate initial outcomes, track referrals, and adjust programming as needed.

Year 2 and beyond: Expand partnerships, continue education, track long-term data, and sustain services through community support and funding.

How will you know if your project/program is successful or effective?

Success will be measured through both quantitative and qualitative outcomes. Data will include the number of students and families reached, referrals made to treatment or recovery programs, and reductions in school-related drug incidents. Surveys will be conducted with students, families, and staff to assess changes in awareness, attitudes, and behaviors regarding substance use. Regular reports will be compiled and reviewed with school administrators and community partners to ensure continuous improvement and accountability.

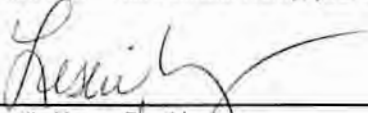

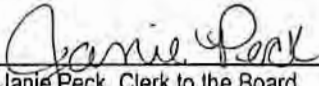

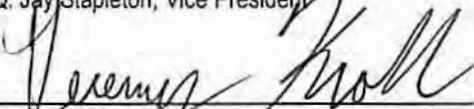
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
